In my first year as the Chief of Police, I led the Kansas City Missouri Police Department through historic times that will forever impact the KCPD and Kansas City.



The monument located in front of Police Headquarters is comprised of a bronze statue, measuring 8'4" and weighing 11 tons, situated atop a seven-ton Missouri red granite base, measuring 10'8". This sculpture is the second memorial dedicated as a tribute to the police officers of Kansas City, who gave their lives in the discharge of their duties.

The bronze statue was started in the summer of 1920 with work done by local artist Robert Merrell Gage. Two models were used for the policemen, William E. Bondurant (born in 1881) and Ira Boyle (1888-1942), and three for the small child, William's daughter, Marjorie Bondurant, Ira's daughter, Margaret Boyle, and Donald Patterson. The memorial was completed a year later in 1921 and placed at 15th and The Paseo.

In April of 1949, the memorial was moved from its location on Paseo, cleaned, and mounted on red granite. At that time, 65 names were honored on the base. Twenty-three were added and the monument was rededicated in September of that year and moved to 59th and Paseo. It was not until February 16, 1973, that the monument was moved to its current location in front of Police Headquarters and bears the names of all of Kansas City officers who have given their lives in the line of duty.



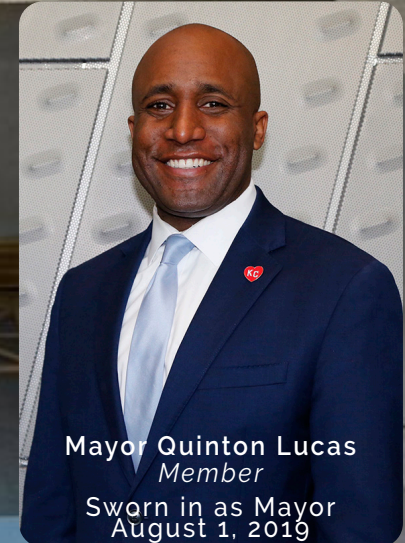

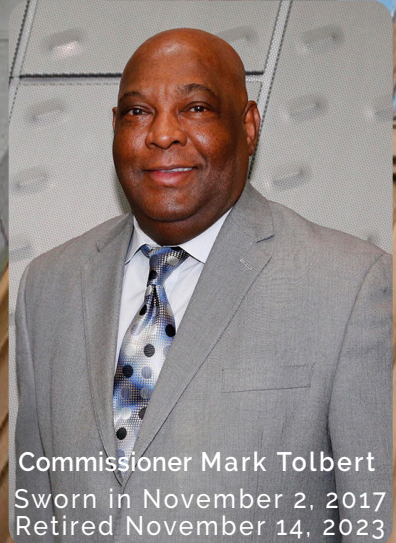

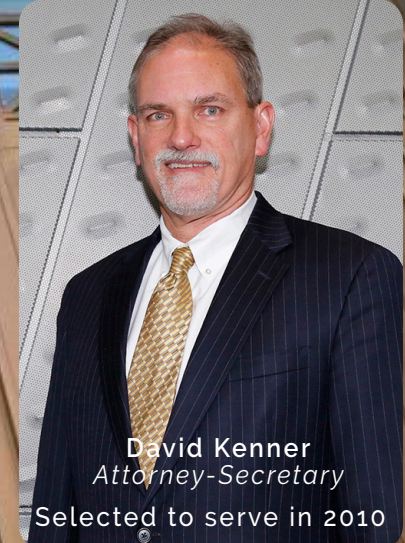

According to Missouri Statute, the Board of Police Commissioners has the responsibility of providing police service to citizens of Kansas City, Missouri.

With the exception of a period from 1933 to 1939, the Police Department has been controlled by a Board of Police Commissioners since its 1874 inception.

Board members are appointed by the Governor of Missouri and must be Kansas City residents.

Commissioners serve four-year terms.

The fifth member of the Board is the Mayor of Kansas City, by virtue of elected office.

The Secretary/Attorney is appointed by the Board.

## Executive Services BUREAU



Deputy Chief Derek McCollum

For 29 years, **Derek McCollum** has served at KCPD, working a variety of assignments, including the role of Major over the Fiscal Division. His budgetary expertise is invaluable in his role as Deputy Chief of the Executive Services Bureau which oversees department-wide money matters.

The responsibilities of this bureau, which includes the Fiscal, Information Services and Logistical Support Divisions, Communications and Communication Support Units, is to administer the department's financial processes and its supporting elements.

McCollum sees his role as instrumental across bureaus.

*"I have the opportunity to see firsthand the impact the professional staff has each day which makes overseeing the Executive Services Bureau extremely rewarding. With the highest concentration of non-sworn members, everything the Executive Services Bureau does impacts the entire department. From our first responders in the Communications Unit to those maintaining the fleet, they play a significant role".*

## Administrative BUREAU

**Doug Niemeier** was promoted to Deputy Chief of the Executive Services Bureau in 2021. In his time there, he helped secure salary adjustments for KCPD employees. He also oversaw the move to reclassify more than 400 employees so that they could earn more pay.

In December of 2022, Chief Stacey Graves appointed Niemeier to Deputy Chief of the Administration Bureau. Through information technology and record-keeping functions, this bureau provides administrative support to the entire Department. It also oversees the Kansas City Regional Crime Laboratory. In addition, the Administration Bureau now houses Human Resources and the police academy.

*"It is beneficial to have them together under the same command staff. While KCPD faces a shortage of police officers, the standard to become one remains high."*

# Investigations BUREAU

Deputy Chief Luis Ortiz



In 2000, **Luis Ortiz** found his way to the Kansas City Missouri Police Department, in part, because of its reputation. He wanted to be a part of the professionalism it offered.

Working an array of assignments that included almost a decade in the Street Narcotics Unit and Gang squad, Ortiz helped recover massive amounts of drugs, illegal money, and weapons.

This experience serves him well as the Deputy Chief of the Investigations Bureau. The professionalism he's abided on helps the bureau solve more cases.

*"The more we can prove we are being genuine about relationships with the community, they'll (the community) see it. More people will give us information and cooperate in our investigations."*

This bureau is responsible for investigating crime, conducting narcotics enforcement and oversees the Law Enforcement Resource Center.

# Patrol BUREAU

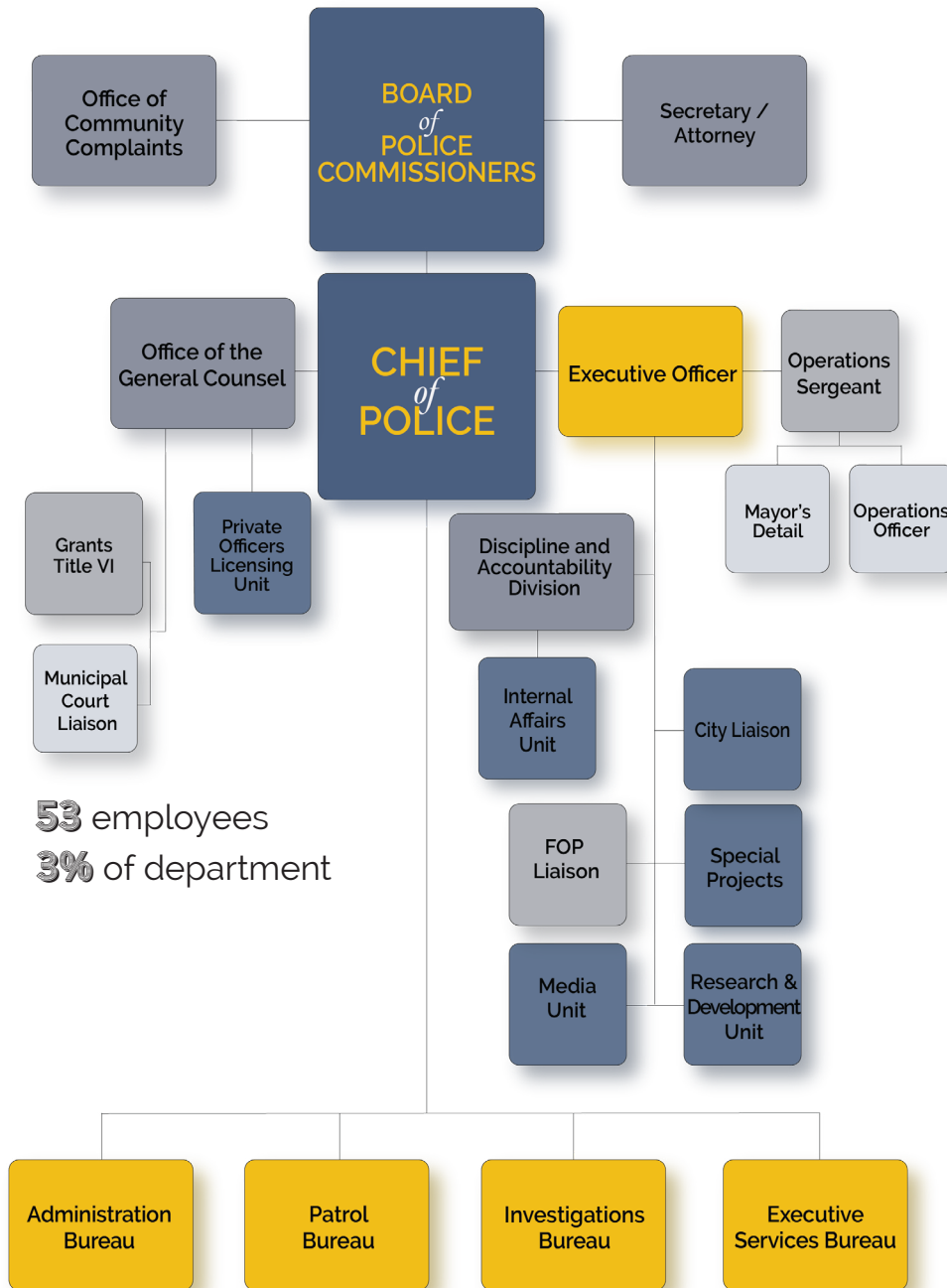
Deputy Chief Joseph Mabin



Having led the department as Interim Chief from April to December 2022 and now Deputy Chief of the Patrol Bureau, **Joseph Mabin** knows his purpose. It's to give of himself to make life safer and better in Kansas City.

*"I'm focused on supporting the men and women of the patrol division to make them the most professional, highly-trained officers in the region,"* Mabin explained. *"I want to encourage and support them in working with the community to reduce gun crime, juvenile crime, and quality of life issues."*

The largest bureau in the department, the Patrol Bureau, is responsible for responding to 911 calls for service, taking crime reports, providing tactical support, enforcing traffic laws, and investigating property crimes. The Patrol Bureau emphasizes a focus on community engagement and strategically targeted enforcement toward those who cause the greatest threat to our community.

As the Executive Officer to the Chief's Office, **Steve Young** is on familiar ground. He once held this position while holding the rank of major. That experience is invaluable because Young began this new role at the start of 2023 already familiar with its requirements and its method of operation.

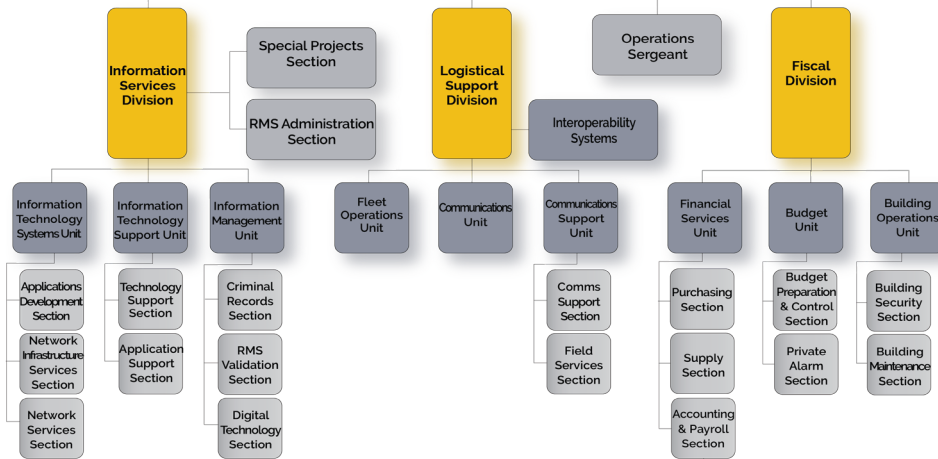

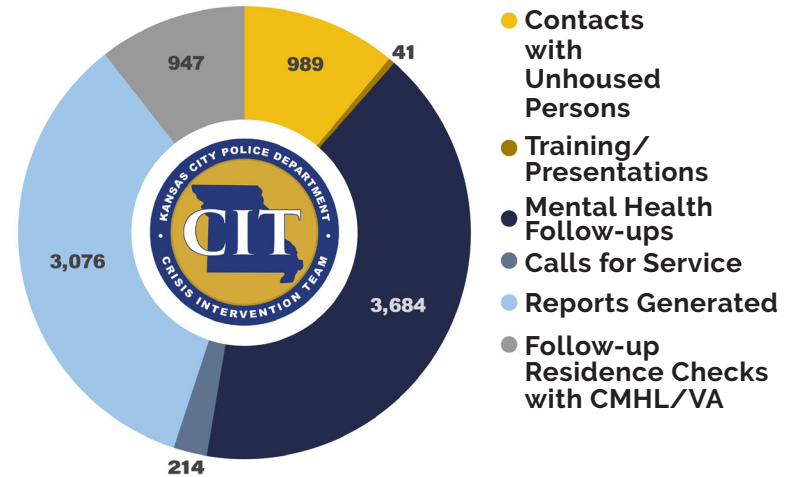
### Follow-Up Residence Checks 4-Year Comparison



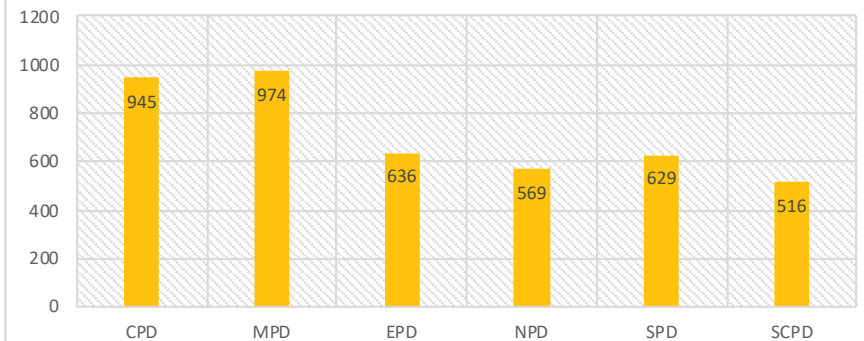
### ICAT Training

In 2023, 45 trainers underwent specialized training in Integrating Communications, Assessment, and Tactics (ICAT), focusing on new methods and strategies to de-escalate situations involving individuals armed with weapons other than firearms, unarmed individuals, or those experiencing a mental health crisis. ICAT places a strong emphasis on dialogue and empathy. Subsequently, these trained trainers proceeded to educate all officers within the department.

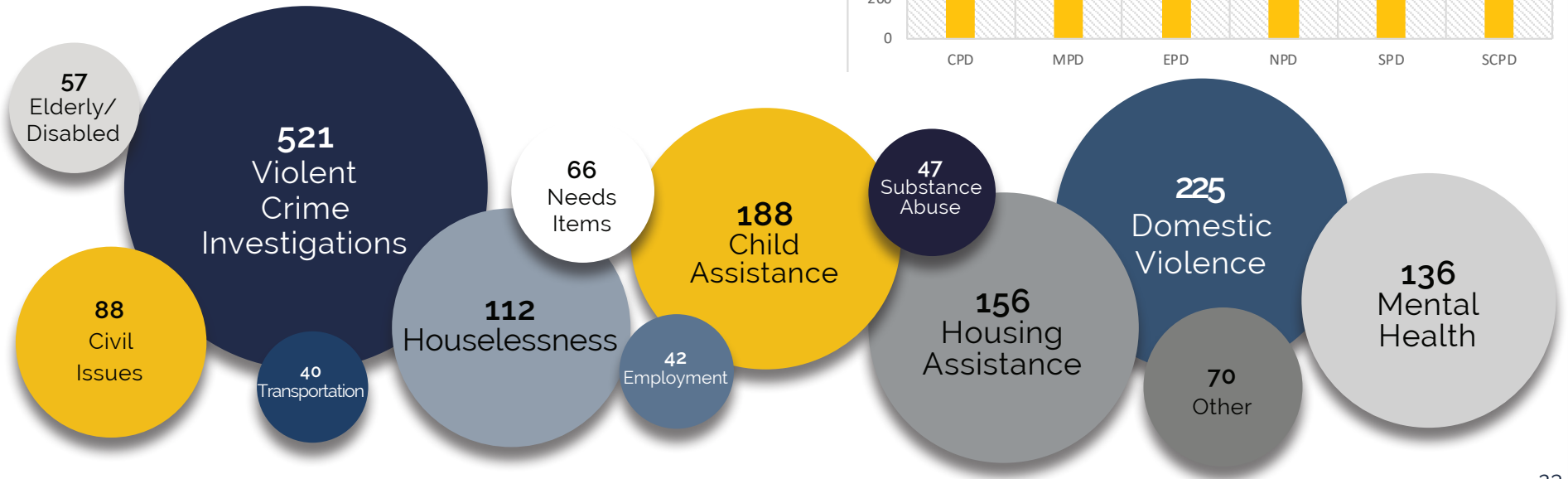
### CIT Interactions

The Youth Programs Section partners with prosecutors to provide consequences for our parents who fail to ensure their children attend school on a regular basis.

In 2023, our *School Resource Officers* wrote **64** Truancy Reports and issued **85** General Ordinance Summons to parents.



## FIRST IMPACT

Vehicle accidents claim more teenage lives than any other cause. In 2022, trainers from the state visited the Police Athletic League (PAL) Center and provided a comprehensive four-hour training session. This session certified all members of the Youth Programs Section to deliver the 90-minute **"First IMPACT"** course to students, parents, and school staff. First IMPACT, a program developed by ThinkFirst Missouri in collaboration with the MODoT Highway Safety & Traffic Division, aims to enhance traffic safety awareness among parents (and teenagers). Its evidence-based approach targets reducing new driver accidents, injuries, and fatalities by bolstering parental understanding and enforcement of Missouri's Graduated Driver License law. In 2023, the **Youth Programs Section** conducted four First IMPACT classes for members of the Kansas City community, free of charge.

**STRATEGIC INTERVENTION MEETINGS**

Strategic intervention meetings are structured to occur proactively and reactively in response to concerns about a Police Athletic League (PAL) youth. Instances such as observed difficulties in emotional regulation, potential involvement in criminal activities, or disruptive behavior either at home or while at PAL events may trigger the convening of an intervention meeting. At the very least, these meetings involve the PAL team and the juvenile. Moreover, they often include a combination of the following participants: a parent or legal guardian, other family members familiar with the situation, a KCPD Social Services Specialist, a Crisis Intervention Team officer, and the caseworker. This collaborative and targeted approach enables the PAL team to maintain active involvement in the lives of our youths and their families. Furthermore, these meetings serve as opportunities to nurture relationships between PAL, other departmental units, and various community partners and stakeholders.

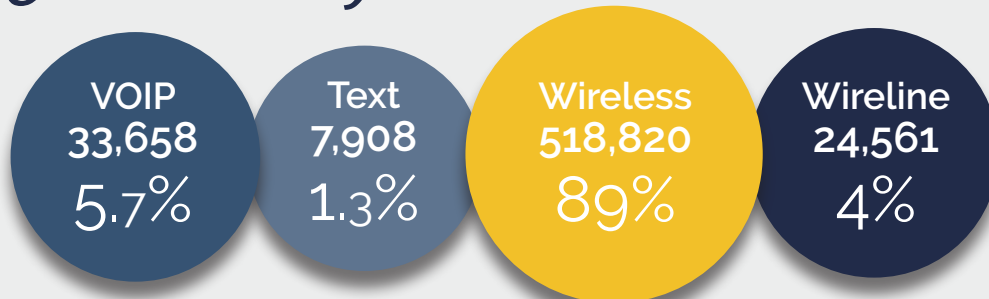

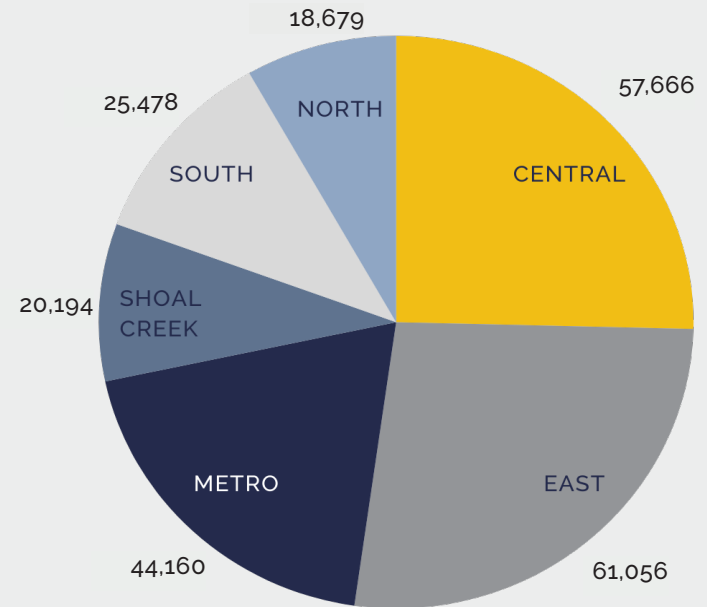

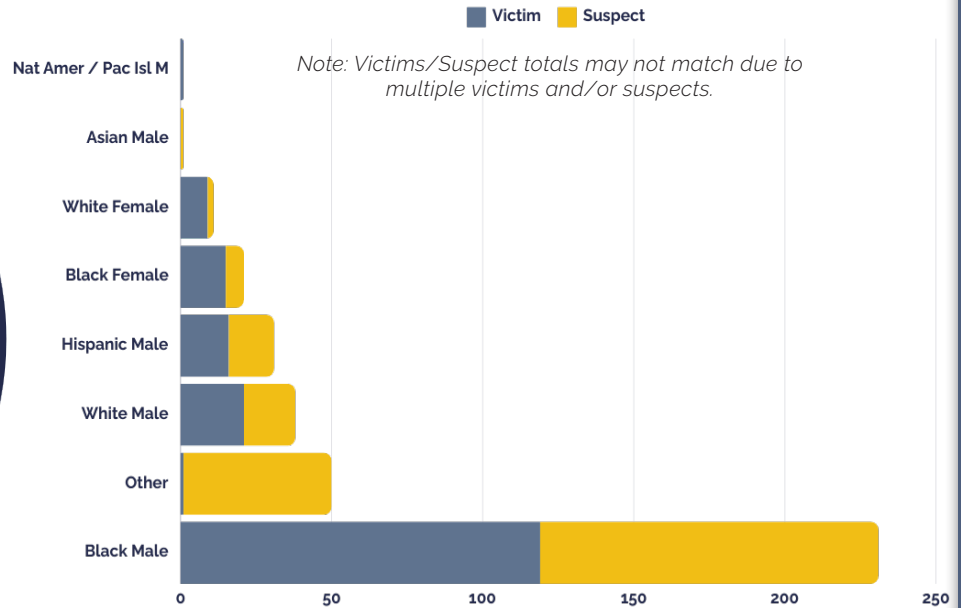
